Related parties

In addition to Future Skills Training, a limited company called Future Skills Limited exists to trade as a consultancy arm of Future Skills Training, should any opportunities arise. The director is Mr P Thain, and the secretary is Mr A Thain.

Risk management

The Directors have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

To advance in life and help at risk and vulnerable young people by providing education and training which develops their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society and mature to responsible adults.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

During this financial year Future Skills Training impacted regularly 84 young people across 5 projects.

The Learn2Live project, supporting young people from Francis Barber now it's in 4th year, has settled on a format that works really well for the young people. We worked with 15 young people in small groups of up to 6, two mornings per week, engaging in a variety of activities to develop their personal and social skills, enabling them to better access more formal education. During the year, 7 of these re-entered mainstream education and 11 out of the 15 developed their personal and social skills.

The Lean on Me mentoring project, funded by the Tom ap Rhys Pryce Memorial Trust (Toms Trust), supported 11 young people, some mentored by staff and some by volunteers. 2 of the young people entered training, 2 reintegrated into mainstream education and 1 into employment. 8 of the young people improved their personal and social skills

The girls group for the 5 girls from the local Peabody Estate, continued in partnership with St Marks Church. The group engaged in a variety of different sessions including healthy eating, fitness, and creative sessions. As the group progressed the girls were encouraged to take more initiative, which they did. From September 2010 the group developed into 2:1 mentoring relationships. This started well, with the girls meeting regularly with their mentors and enjoying their sessions, however after the initial good start issues began to arise with the girls communication with their mentors which impacted the attendance of sessions. The mentoring then ended in March 2011. Despite the challenges, all five of the girls improved their personal and social skills, and benefited from being able to talk with their mentors about issues they were facing in their lives.

From small beginnings last year, Goals, our after school football project, steadily grew this year. By the end of the financial year on average 10 young people were attending weekly, with some sessions attracting 14 young people. In addition the development of the boys attitudes, teamwork and football skills was hugely evident to the team, with the post session evaluations recording mainly positive responses. Overall this year, 23 young people were impacted by Goals, and 4 of them progressed to the Sunday League team, Battersea Lions, that is organised by the coach we use for Goals. In addition, 15 of those who attended regularly recorded notable development in their personal and social skills.

Infuse, our youth café and music venue, delivered in partnership with St Marks Church, overall had an encouraging year. We estimated an average of 16 young people attending on a weekly basis, with some weeks attracting over 30 young people. We have impacted around 40 young people through Infuse this year. The majority of those attending were either those known to Future Skills, or those who are part of the St Marks youth group, Inhabit. Some of these young people also brought their friends, and some came from three other local schools. Relationships between staff and young people were deepened, and as we had hoped, some of the young people from different backgrounds developed friendships too, showing that social divisions can be overcome if young people are given a safe environment in which to spend time.

As part of the funding secured from the Youth Opportunities Fund to begin Infuse, 8 young people completed a level 2, food hygiene certificate, allowing them to assist in the kitchen, which a number of them have done regularly. Some of our regulars have also begun to help out as waiters.

In the summer we ran an Infuse stall at the Northcote Road festival, with 15 of the young people helping out throughout the day. This was a great way of raising the profile of Infuse, building the young people's confidence and raising some additional funds from all that was sold.

Also in the summer, we secured funding from Comic Relief, through the Thames Community Foundation, towards the staff costs of Future Skills delivering the café. This funding is for two years, taking us up to September 2012. Next year we intend to engage in more communication to other local schools and youth groups to encourage new young people to attend Infuse.

In addition to the main projects, we have delivered other notable results. Happenings this year have included:

- The Chief Executive joining the Wandsworth "You're Welcome" steering group. This group looks to improve the health services available to young people in the borough through a quality assurance process called "You're Welcome". This came through FST's membership of the Wandsworth Link
- The Chief Executive being invited to join the Centre for Social Justice, Youth Justice working group, that aims to produce a comprehensive report, reviewing the Youth Justice System in the UK and making recommendations to improve it.
- The Chief Executive continued as a member of the Northcote Ward Safer Neighbourhood Panel.
- Through the funding received from Toms Trust, FST is now part of the Toms Trust network, that seeks to support all the organisations that have received funding from the trust, through regular network meetings to share ideas and resources where possible, and encourage greater partnership working.
- One of our volunteers, who began volunteering in August, was one of several successful applicants to receive funding from the Vodafone Foundation, to work for their chosen charity for two months. She began her two months full time position at FST in March, and we hope to keep her on full time when the funding ends in April. She is both developing a health project for young people and getting involved in other aspects of our work.
- FST continues to work through the local education department's quality assurance process for alternative providers.
- FST has continued to seek partnerships with a number of organisations including, Nightingale School, Music and Change and Church.co.uk.

Following the Future Developments of last years report:

- FST's values are now complete and on the website
- · Infuse cafe has grown in numbers
- Two new trustees have been appointed
- We have found someone who can assist with the marketing of Future Skills and are just beginning to explore ways forward.
- Unfortunately, discussions with Peabody Trust Head Office have been unsuccessful.
- We continue to seek a suitable database system.

Fundraising activities

 £25,000 over two years from Comic Relief through the Thames Community Foundation, towards the staff costs of Infuse.

- £2750 from the Vodafone World of Difference Campaign towards two months salary for a volunteer to work full time for FST.
- £1500 from St Marks Church mission giving

Future Developments and Plans

- To incorporate a suitable database system that allows us to better evaluate our work and present the findings.
- To promote the work of Future Skills at St Marks Church more to increase the number of regular financial donors and the number of volunteers.
- To deliver AQA qualifications through Francis Barber PRU. This allows some of our young people to gain recognised qualifications for their personal and social development.
- To pursue the idea of our mentoring project becoming a COACH¹ programme, approved by the Mentoring and Befriending Foundation.
- To continue developing and growing Infuse

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2011

1 Status of Future Skills Training

Future Skills Training is a company limited by guarantee and is a registered charity.

2 Principal accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

(a) Fund accounting

The charity maintains two types of funds. General unrestricted funds are funds available for use at the discretion of the board of trustees in furtherance of the general charitable objectives. Restricted funds are funds subject to specific conditions imposed by donors.

(b) Incoming resources

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income, receipt is certain and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

(c) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the company and include the cost of the annual preparation of the accounts.

(d) Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

(e) Going Concern

The charity has sufficient liquid resources at the year-end to fulfil its restricted fund obligations at the year-end. The Trustees believe that future surpluses will be generated and the current deficit will be eliminated in the short term. On this basis the Trustees consider the charity a going concern and that these accounts are properly drawn up on a going concern basis.
